

Letter from the President,

Change can be frightening...or it can be a great stimulus to our creativity.

We each have our own comfort level when we are confronted with things that are new or different.

Some artists are happiest when they are working in familiar territory. They narrow the scope of their work to perfect their skills.

Others go out of their way to experiment with media and techniques, getting great satisfaction with surprising results.

Personally, I find a change in scenery stimulates my interest in the paintings I'm working on. Painting at the beach or in the western desert states makes me look at the mountain views with fresh eyes when I return.

Change your subject matter. If you have been doing landscapes, try figures. If you're a portrait painter, do some still lifes. Been painting apples? Do a painting of your dog. Your drawing and observation skills will improve when you tackle new subjects.

Try some new colors. We all have our favorite palettes. Go brighter...or more neutral. Are you used to sunny scenes? Try a misty lake. Painted lots of mountain sunsets? Take a close look at an ocean wave.

Do you always use white sanded papers? Try red Canson.

Borrow some firmer/softer/other brands of pastels than the ones you've been using. Trade boxes for the day with a friend. Let your style be reflected by the change.

You get the idea.

You may return to the subjects, colors, papers, and pastel brands you've always used...but your work will reflect a new vigor and maturity.

APS Member Edward Morris has offered to provide a demonstration on how he photographs his own artwork.

This 2 hour demonstration will be perfect for those who take and edit photographs to enter shows, upload jpgs to websites and blogs, or need to provide photos of their paintings for publicity purposes.

Eddie is being kind enough to offer his demos for 'free' to APS members at his home and art studio in Flat Rock on Saturday, November 5th and Tuesday, November 8th, starting at 10:00 am both days.

Below is more information from Eddie about what he plans to cover in each session.

Demo Description:

"Over the years, I have taught myself how to photograph my artwork from magazine articles and on-line research. I know enough to be dangerous!

I have an SLR digital camera, a modest (\$\$) but powerful, simple to use photo editing program that I use to color correct with a gray card, crop, and covert the image to jpg at the resolution and dpi required for a particular show. Before I got this fancy, I used to photograph my art outside with a point and shoot.

I will do a demonstration of photographing one of my paintings from start to finish.

Here are some of the topics that I will cover:

Set up and equipment

Photographing Procedures (inside and outside)

Parallax issues

Using your computer

- Photo editing
- Color correction
- Renaming files, dpi and resolution

If we have time, I would also like to discuss a nifty free program I use to create a 3 or 4 value posterization to evaluate the composition and structure of my paintings.

Please keep in mind that I am not an expert photographer or computer geek but an artist who needed to learn a good/simple way to photograph my art for my website and entering shows. My process has been developed over the last 10 years through trial and error. "

WILDFLOWERS IN PASTEL - Program and Workshops with Karen Margulis PSA November 12 & 13, 2011

About the Workshops

"I am excited to offer these workshops on painting meadows and wildflowers in pastel. Pastels are the perfect medium to capture the delicate beauty and vibrant colors of wildflowers and the landscape around them. I will offer demonstrations, exercises and individual help at the easel during the workshops.

The Saturday morning program will be an overview of my approach to painting wildflowers in the landscape, with me sharing a variety of techniques and doing a short demonstration.

I will be offering a three hour mini workshop after the presentation on Saturday. Our emphasis for this mini workshop is to learn ways of seeing color in wildflowers and their surroundings and how to choose the pastels to help paint these colors with emphasis on the effects of aerial perspective. I will also share ways for you to deal with all of the Greens in a landscape.

About Karen Margulis

I studied art in college but it wasn't until 2005 that I began painting seriously. I have been creating a daily painting and posting to my blog every day, and I estimate that I have completed about a mile of canvas or in my case paper! I paint primarily in pastel but I am venturing slowly into the world of oils and acrylics. My small daily paintings are available for purchase on my blog or at www.dailypainters.com. I am represented by these fine art galleries in the Southeast: High Country Art in Blue Ridge, Georgia, Bella Vista Fine Art in Asheville, North Carolina, Frameworks Gallery in Marietta, Georgia, and Primary Elements Gallery in Cannon Beach, Oregon. I am a Signature member of the Pastel Society of America and a Member of Excellence in the Southeastern Pastel Society. On Sunday I will continue our study of wildflowers with a full day workshop. Our focus will be the intimate landscape and close up portraits of wildflowers. We will discover how a wet underpainting can be utilized for a successful painting of wildflowers. I will also share techniques for achieving the loose painterly quality to wildflowers and how to make them look like they belong in the landscape. There will be special emphasis on painting daisies, Queen Anne's Lace and poppies. During both workshops there will be discussions, demos and plenty of time for you to apply these ideas and techniques to your own painting."

All 'Karen Margulis / Wildflowers in Pastel' events will be held at the WNC Ag Center in Fletcher, NC.

- Easel
- backing board and white artist tape or clips to attach paper
- Pastels
- Paper: bring several pieces of your favorite paper. Plan on bringing a few pieces of sanded paper that can take a wet underpainting. My favorite is UArt as it is less likely to buckle.
- small watercolor set (an inexpensive set is fine)
- Paint brush....inexpensive bristle brush
- Small sketchbook and pencil
- Reference photos of wildflowers and meadows. I have photos available but it is always better to work from your own photos.

Meet the Artist of the Month - Suzanne Karnatz

"Nan's Garden"

How do I begin – to weave a tale of 28 years as a pastel artist! You would think I would get tired of the same ole medium. Not so – it is the most exciting hands-on unbelievable colors that you mess together – be it neutral-grayish or your brights. The range of pastel "sticks" hard, semi soft, soft, square, big, thin, round stubs or tubes, paper supports of all kinds – enabling you, the artist, to create beyond your dreams.

I dug out old notes, sketches, process photos, little plein-aire pieces. I thought that was the only way to create landscapes: up at the crack of dawn to the sound of grunting pigs (Dan Gerhart's Wisconsin territory) early morning farm chores: as I was finishing the painting – behind me comes a farmer on his tractor with his wife holding on with her arms around her husband's waist!; Painting in one particular garden (14 paintings or more) with the company of Alex the pet rooster sitting on the back part of my easel; Painting in a horse pasture, along comes two four legged friends - curious and wanting to nudge my easel and a bite of pastels; One of Handell outings capturing one of the streams in Cherokee National Forest. Rubber boots, easel legs propped and balanced at water's edge – so enthralled with catching the excitement of rushing waters; another in the pasture at the Sandburg farm painting one of Helga's dear pregnant goats.

Wonderful years at Palette 'n Chisel with art friends from the American Academy AM class, then more figure drawing in afternoon and soon Richard Schmid is coming upstairs to 3rd floor attic of the Italian Renaissance Building. Classes 1-4, then 6-10 – Awesome to watch Richard paint (oil). From this group of 8-12

people, at least 6 artists are national level artists. Then I had to catch a bus, a train, car home – everyone

asleep. (youngest was 16) (This didn't happen too often – I had to just stay and watch and pastel what happened at evening figure set-ups – Once in a blue moon – yet there were several blue moons!)

So – (1) thumbnails, value thinking, direction of light mark yellow dot. (2) step back, look again - visualize then start blocking or drawing your image. You can work from center outward, or from focus point outward, I never have been able to work all over the painting and build that way. Think design, composition - I do gamsol wash - 3 large shapes in complimentary colors - A. Handell was at the Palette n Chisel and used a turp wash -1991 – from that time on I use this approach as does Richard McKinley (gamsol, or H2O) not necessarily complimentary color - Small world, and guess what - Handell and McKinley are painting friends.

Never stop seeing, thinking, doing; explore for the rest of my life. Pastel is not only a passion – it's almost an obsession. The best there can be.

P.S. I had worked in H2O, casein, acrylic, oil in prior school years.

Program on Linear Perspective, September 10 — Report by Nancy Clausen

The program on Linear Perspective was presented by Annie Cicale. She has taught at AB Tech and has written books on perspective. Kay Gordon has taken many of her classes. Annie now teaches at her home in Fairview.

We all start with lines, manmade or lines made in nature. To see a good example of Linear perspective, we can look at Ann Vasilik's work. Examples of different perspective.



- 1. Overlapping
- 2. Size and space variations, placement
- 3. Detail and edges, degree of finishing
- 4. Modeling, value gradiation and /or horizon line
- 5. Placement, how you perceive
- 6. Ariel perspective, color and value change
- 7. Linear perspective, converging lines

Brunelleschi was thought to have rediscovered linear perspective during the Italian Renaissance. Masaccia possibly was the first artist to have used perspective in a painting. He dates back to 1268. The painting that was used as an example, the vanishing point was the head of Christ.

The vanishing point is not always in the middle of the painting or photo.



Anne explained that one point perspective was looking straight ahead at something. Two point perspective is two planes going away from you. We then adjourned for lunch and met back for her workshop in the afternoon.


Ann Templeton - Published in Houston Chronicle on October 21, 2011
