

Letter from the President—Gary Rupp

Time to Remember

Looking back on 2016 I asked myself, "What did I learn this past year that helped my painting in pastels?" Was it a new technique? Was it new equipment? Was it a new type of frame? Was it a new color produced by one of the many excellent pastel manufacturers? Was it a different lighting set up in my studio? Was it working on a new surface?

These are all good questions for artists to ask themselves on a regular basis, but none of these answered the question of what I had learned that truly changed the way I painted. The answer that came to my mind was probably more about an attitude shift than a new technique or new equipment. Three shifts in particular got my attention.

First, I started to challenge my thought that I wanted the result of each painting to be a masterpiece; or at least it should be better than what I had produced last week, or last month. I found this "masterpiece mindset" was hurting my ability to explore new ways of painting, and putting a pressure on my work that was only coming from me! No one was keeping score on how many failures, or successes, I was painting. I found that every painting had taught me something—even if it was "don't do that again!" It was time to remember why I was painting, because the process brought me joy, not necessarily a masterpiece.

Second, I found myself in several situations last year where I could feel a pressure to compete with my fellow artists rather than share a painting experience together and enjoy each others' work. I recognize this competitiveness when I lose focus on what I'm doing, start comparing my painting with the others around me, and begin to make judgments on whose winning or losing the art game. It was time to remember painting is not a competition, but a sharing of your vision of the world.

Third, I discovered myself slipping into thinking if I can't do it perfectly, then why do it at all? Of course, this attitude created an untenable situation for me. How do you move forward without risk? We all know the dread that can spread through us as we stare at a blank surface. I found a quote last year that said, "To require perfection is to invite paralysis." It was time to remember the only sure fire way to avoid making mistakes in painting was to never start painting at all; fortunately, I knew that was not an option I was willing to take.

My hope for 2017 is to continue to learn about pastel painting and I know that APS is an organization that does just that. I'm looking forward to what we will all discover in the year ahead!

Artist of the Month — Gina Roberts Snyder

The pastels waited. Having been loved and cherished by my mother, now they were boxed and stored for 36 years, opened only a handful of times. Seasons came and went. An art education degree was earned. Children grew. Bills were paid. Grandchildren arrived. Yet, those magical hues waited—until late 2016.



My son had requested a painting of his dairy cow (Tula) that he jointly owns with several other families. I dusted off the boxes of pastels and began, surprised by my success. So, I did another painting of Tula, and then another! Looking out my window, I became obsessed with rendering the stately white pine trees with mountains behind. I joined Asheville Urban Landscape Painters (AULP)— a local en plein air group—and learned from the many artists who demonstrated: Rich Nelson, Jo Ridge Kelly, Mark Harmon, Robert Simone, Lisa Blackshear, and our own Cathyann Burgess. I took a workshop from Karen Margulis near Atlanta and another from Addren Doss after joining APS. Values, hues, and compositions began to emerge as when the fog is clearing. I began seeing in a different way. And, the pastels have become loved once more.

When I draw or paint, I look intentionally, deeply. It's like the difference between walking by a bakery window and going in and eating a luscious éclair or other sense-filling treat. Taking a photograph or just looking at something doesn't make a lasting enough impression on me. Once I have rendered a subject, I have a much deeper appreciation of that object or that moment—the



mood, the essence of what makes it unique. From then on, I have more of an intimate friendship with the subject. What does work for me is really quite simple. I want





Wednesday, May 3: Opening

Thursday, May 11: Reception for Artists Saturday, June 17: Last day of show

Monday, June 19: Artists pick-up paintings between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Preparing your Paintings:

To help you prepare paintings for the show, the following size guidelines will apply:

- Total image height + width not to exceed 20"
- Total framed height + width not to exceed 36"



Here is a painting by APS artist, Zoe F. Schumaker, that meets the overall size requirements:

Blue Heaven
9x11 total image height + width
12x14 total outside framed height + width

To support artists submitting work for the show, BlackBird can offer a 20% discount on any custom framing for the show - normally the artist discount is 15%.


BlackBird will retain a commission of 40% of the price listed on each work.

The January 14th, 2017 APS member meeting featured a "Paint Around." Artists Deborah Squier, Alec Hall, Susan Sinyai, Nancy Clausen and Robbins Richardson set-up their easels with a basic sketch, along with reference photos, and laid out their pastels for this fun activity. Equal numbers of artists formed in lines in front of each of the five easels, and Board Member Jim Hefley yelled, "GO!" With his timer in hand, the four-minute clock was set. Every four minutes each person at an easel moved to the back of the next line, waiting to paint at the next easel.

There was lots of observing, socializing and learning going on in the lines while each person waited their turn to be at the easel. In ninety minutes there were five great paintings mostly completed.




- ♦ It was great to work on all the different surfaces

I wanted to give the membership a progress report on the 2017 National Show and Workshop.

The exhibition will be hosted by the Burke Arts Council at the Jailhouse Gallery in Morganton, NC and will run from October 18th through November 17th, 2017. The APS board is offering a top prize of \$1,200, and we will also have cash awards for second and third place. Lorraine King has generously donated \$200. Nancy Clausen has been gathering up merchandise awards including a full set of Great American pastels and gift certificates from Richeson, Terry Ludwig, Dakota, and more! If that isn't enough to entice you to enter, remember that all accepted paintings receive APS Special Membership points toward Signature Status.

Our juror and workshop instructor is the dynamic and inspiring pastel and multi-media artist, Dawn Emerson. Dawn has spent the past 25 years creating art, teaching, and working to push the boundaries of the pastel medium. She has produced three instructional DVDs, and has a new book, "Pastel Innovations," to be released in June, 2017. Dawn will be sharing some of her latest techniques during the 4-day workshop offered in conjunction with the show. The workshop is currently full, but we will be maintaining a waiting list and want to encourage interested APS members to sign up. There is no deposit required to be added to the waiting list. Jim Hefley has developed a robust publicity plan to encourage submissions and also generate enthusiasm for the show. We have an ad in the next Pastel Journal (March/April), as well as one in the May/June issue. We will also have announcements with regional pastel societies and in a variety of local media.

Suzy Hart is preparing the online entry system using Call for Entry Online (Café). The system will open for entries on April 16th and will remain open until midnight on July 16th. So, there is still plenty of time to paint those masterpieces!

It takes a team of talented and hard-working individuals to pull off an endeavor of this magnitude. I am thankful to all who are helping, especially Kay Gordon, who has been mentoring me and assisting with just about everything. There are still a number of activities that will require member support, so please let me know if you are interested in helping out. And, I look forward to seeing many of you in the show and at the workshop!


