Recently, I had the privilege of painting plein air with twenty-nine other artists for a week long paint out. What struck me was how we all shared the same objective of producing a painting a day, the same location, the same weather, the same pigments and yet no two paintings were alike. I watched how two or three artists would look at the same landscape and then create entirely different, yet completely recognizable places. Not only that, but how in looking at another artist's painting, my view of that particular subject was now altered. I simply had not seen before what the other artist painted. Their work changed my view of the world.

So what do you do when you see someone else's work being successful? Do you change your style? Do you attempt to paint their way? Do you abandon your vision and say theirs is better? In the film At Eternity's Gate, which concentrates on the last year of van Gogh's life; it shows how much Vincent believed his art could bring change to the world. One of his sayings, "I am seeking, I am striving, I am in it with all my heart." permeates the film. In one scene, Vincent and Paul Gauguin are painting the same lady. They exhibit completely different approaches and styles with Gauguin reprimanding van Gogh for his technique and application of the paint. Vincent holds his own and stays with his own style. I tried to imagine what would the world have lost if, in that moment, van Gogh had quit and changed his painting style only to gain Gauguin's approval? A unique vision of the world would have been gone. And the world would now be a poorer place. To find your own vision, staying on your own path and growing into your own particular style is never easily done. There simply is not one formula that works for everyone. Many ingredients are needed.

Elizabeth Mowry has real wisdom in suggesting "learn from many, but then create your own way." I believe one of the most critical elements in this process is to put yourself in a place where other artists encourage, support and nurture this unique journey for you. I hope APS will always be known for providing that kind of environment for all its members. Come and journey with us in 2019!


If I were to describe myself, I would say Wife, Mom, Yogi, (sometimes successful) gardener, animal lover, tree hugger, and hopefully, an aspiring pastel artist!

I just began immersing myself in pastels only a year ago. I never would have thought that I'd choose it as my favorite medium. Through high school and college, any pastel work I ever attempted resulted in.....mud!!! That is, until I took an intro course from Deborah Kidwell in Brevard. That short class was radically transformative - I was so excited! I began looking for more courses in this region and found Beverly Kies. Through these two ladies, I've learned so much about technique and vibrant COLOR!! (And hopefully, I haven't made too much of a pest of myself!!) I'm also expanding outwardly for more lessons, through the internet, books, videos, workshops : anything I can get my hands on!

This isn't my first experience with art, though. I majored in Interior Design in college, which requires a majority of fine art courses. I also had an ongoing passion with stained glass and designed windows for a Stained Glass business in Overland Park, Kansas.

I was raised in Eastern NC, the third of four daughters in a Methodist household. Like most children, the sermons on Sunday mornings were boring to me, but I didn't mind because I was transfixed by the beautiful stained glass windows in our church. I loved the way the sun transformed the colors in the sanctuary as it would shine through the ancient glass. This was the beginning of my understanding of the play of light, shade, beauty, spirituality.


After moving many times around and out of the country with job transfers, I have settled in Brevard with my husband, David. I teach yoga in a number of venues, one being a residential treatment facility for young women with eating disorders. I try to instill in them the importance of being in the present moment, observation (inwardly and outwardly), compassion towards themselves and others, seeing beauty in simple things, and seeing themselves as the miracle that they are. I also began teaching a creativity course to give them a chance to explore and to feel empowered. Our art explorations have included book binding, mandala designing, altered books, print making, and creating wind chimes, to name a few.

New Plein Air Easel from Strada Easel – The Strada Mark II





The folks at Strada Easel have introduced a new easel which allows artists to paint larger either in the studio or in plein air.

The easel consists of a flexible mast, which attaches directly to a tripod (theirs or your own). The mast can accommodate a canvas or panel up to 30" in either direction. The Mark II paint tray has retractable armswhich allow the tray to fit over the legs of the tripod. This set up can allow for painting large in the field, yet is extremely lightweight (less than 5 pounds) and portable. While these products lean toward the pricy side, they are really durable and will last for years of painting pleasure.



Tutorial: Understanding Digital Images Part 1

Digital Images ... and Terminology To Better Understand Them

Several people were asking for help to better understand digital images. So, in the next few newsletters, I will explain digital images, provide terminology and help you learn the basics so you can know how to size images for your competition submissions.

This first tutorial is to explain three key pieces of information about a digital image. They are PIXEL, RESOLUTION, and IMAGE COMPRESSION.

What is a Digital Image Anyway? Why do I care about the size?

DIGITAL IMAGES are electronic snapshots taken of a scene or scanned from documents, such as photographs, manuscripts, printed texts, and artwork. The digital image is sampled and mapped as a grid of dots or picture elements (pixels). Each dot – or PIXEL- is assigned a tonal value, such as white, black, shade of gray or color. These PIXELS provide the information that creates the image you see. And important to remember, an individual PIXEL can only be a single color. Digital image diminsions are ALWAYS listed in pixels, such as 680 x 1072. These are arbitrary dimension numbers; they can vary depending on the digital image file.

Definition:

A PIXEL (short for picture element) is a **single point** in a picture. On the monitor of a computer, a pixel is usually a square. Every pixel has a color (a SINGLE color) and all the pixels together form the picture. PPI stands for pixels per inch. When listed as shown below, i.e. 25 x 15 ppi for the eye, these are called the pixel dimensions of the image.

The more PIXELS you have, the greater the RESOLUTION of the image.



Tutorial: Understanding Digital Images Part 1

Digital Images ... and Terminology To Better Understand Them

Definition:

RESOLUTION is the detail an image holds. Higher RESOLUTION means more image detail. A good example of resolution is shown below. Each set of numbers above each image is the number of pixels wide x pixels high. As you can see, the more pixels you have, the greater the resolution of the actual image, in this case the letter "R".



The greater the resolution (meaning more pixels), the larger the image file size will be.

This is important to consider because very large image files are difficult to transmit electronically (by email or text, etc.).

Definition:

IMAGE COMPRESSION is the process of encoding or converting an image file in such a way that it consumes less space than the original file. This is done to make storage easier, reduce overall file size for the end use document, and to make the file easy to transmit electronically. The type of compression technique used can reduce the size of an image file without affecting or degrading its quality to a greater extent. Some software programs – i.e. Powerpoint – have a simple version of a compression tool built into it. There are also specialized software programs to manage compression (Photoshop).

These three factors – PIXELS, RESOLUTION, and IMAGE COMPRESSSION – are the basics of a digital image. They are important to us artists as we often must transmit an image electronically to enter our work in a show. Show entry submission tools frequently have file size limitations, therefore we must often resize our file to fit the limitations of the submission system. Most frequently, we don't need the highest resolution image file because we are not submitting the file for publication in some form of print media. Simply stated, a smaller file will do.

For now, I will let you digest this information. At a future meeting, I will show you how to resize your files without eroding image quality.

Enhancing our APS Experience




APS in Social Media




Upcoming Workshops & Classes




