I start a painting plein air using General's hard charcoal on a single page in an 18x24 sketchbook. I recently began sketching flowers from every angle until I fill the page. Then I take the reference sheet into the studio, decide how I will compose the painting, and paint. "Joy I Feel" was painted on a 400-grit UArt surface with Blue Earth pastels.







As I painted, the heavenly scent of the peony inspired both the painting and the title.




Susan Dawood








My life has been dominated by two passions: animals and art.


My pastel paintings represent a medley of work, celebrating animals, places and people. My love for animals started at the same time as my love for art.




