APS Adventures in Pastel D-1 "The Sky's the Limit"

Welcome to our NEW Adventure Series D which will run for the next six months. Our first Adventure in the series is all about the sky and outer space. Have you ever looked at the night sky and wondered what is out there? Have you ever dreamed of taking flight in order to see the many planets? I remember the first moon landing and how dreaming can sometimes become reality. Then along came Star Wars and gave us a glimpse of what galaxies far, far away might be like. The exciting part is that now with the phenomenal research being done in space we are seeing a bit of what is actually out there.

This Adventure asks you to paint something out in space. You may either use your imagination or be more realistic and paint from some of the incredible pictures that are now available. (See examples below) Feel free to paint planets, stars, comets or even a galaxy. The choice is all yours!

<u>Step 1</u>: Select your surface, size and palette of your choice.

Step 2: Use your imagination or find an inspiring photo of space. Feel free to search out other artists and view their particular renditions of space for more inspiration and ideas.

Step 3: Take a photo of your painting and send it to Kay Gordon (jkaygordon364@gmail.com) by 6:00pm of Wednesday, July 26th. Be sure to send the title and size also. Please include any comments you would like to share as you faced this challenge.

Step 4: Remember this deadline is firm and nothing is posted that is received after 6:00pm on July 26th. Note that your artwork does not need to be in its final form. The Adventures are provided so we can explore painting with pastels together and share what we learn as we grow in our experience and expertise. So enjoy the process and jump in!



I have always enjoyed watching the moon come up especially when it's been full and thinking of all the other stars and planets that can't be seen. It's one of those things that will never change. Reliable.



Black UArt (800) was perfect for this night sky. I did a quick sketch with white charcoal and then started on the sky first. I created the milky way and the basic tones of the sky (from very dark in the distance to softly warm at the bottom). I used a soft light blue pastel for some of the larger stars, and then dusted with particles of white scraped off of a PanPastel pan.

When we are camping, we are often in places that have low light pollution, and see so many stars that there seems to be no space between them.

This was definitely an interesting challenge. When I think of space my mind sees darkness and massive amounts of stars....not too exciting. So I looked through some photos online to get some ideas and I found one that interested me and I used creative license to make it a bit more colorful.

I used dark blue Inktense stick with alcohol as an underpainting and then I used some dark blue pan pastels to bring a darker area on the outer edge using more pans I created the central mass...like celestial clouds in the milky way. I added the excess dust from the pans to create the starry sky. That was a little tricky because some of it flaked off.

Anyway...it was fun and I think I'm going to try out some other ideas. This is "Dynamic Space" 8x10 lux archival using mostly pan pastels.

Full disclosure the photo shows more contrast, therefore, giving it more dimension.

Intergalactic Pears 9 x 12





Mammatus Raincloud



Possibly if I had started the Mammatus piece larger I would be happier with the piece.





The rest was done with hard pastels and pastel pencils. The best part was trying to get the "death beam" to have a variety of colors but also to keep it looking somewhat menacing.
