


APS ADVENTURES IN PASTEL 2024!








Dominant








E-2 from Linda Cook- Onion&Apple





The two things that I had the most trouble with was pressure and curved lines. My left hand kept a very light pressure on the pencil and I would lose control when I tried to increase the pressure on the stroke. My left hand also wanted to keep making straight lines, and we all know that cats have lots of curves in their bodies. Thus, I hope I can keep painting with my right hand for as long as I can stand at my easel. I'll leave the ambidextrous techniques to Leonardo, Ben, and Albert.




I was surprised at how well? my sketch with my nondominant hand (left side) turned out. Maybe that was because I didn't expect a lot and wasn't trying so hard?








This is Carol Rollick.
