The Opening Reception is on Friday, October 18th from 6-8pm.



Vision for the new year: focus on skills

- Non-juried shows to be less dependent on APS promotion
- Juried shows- to be limited to one, and put all our creative and organizational energy to making it an anticipated annual event
- Skills building workshops- As an example: one session, suggested by Deborah Squier, would be to have Q&A with our own members. Set up an easel with one surface or sample surfaces, and have members take turns fielding color mixing or application questions, answer and demo period for each "answerer" being limited to 10 minutes, no more. That would allow for frequent topic changes without short-changing the questions asked. Skills workshops would be informal yet organized in terms of focus and intent, and would take place on "off" months where there is no general member/meeting and program
- Should APS follow the lead of many other pastel societies and reduce our meeting load in the summer?
 A short hiatus of one board and one member meeting would relieve our officers in a season where many
 people are away or have plans.

These are my thoughts going into this coming year. Please share your ideas and comments with me and other board members, give some real thought to giving back to the organization, and let's have fun and color in our lives! Bev Kies shares her process




Some of you saw my painting of "Best Buddies" in the Statewide Show. As I painted I photographed some of the steps that went into the finished piece. First, I applied my large shapes using my Nupastels.

I then went over that with a wash so I could have a good underpainting.



Next, I worked on layering my pastels and refining the drawing for the final result. This painting was a combination of drawing, expressive color and working on a subject I love.

Marsha Savage Workshop

This workshop is held in conjunction with the APS Member Exhibit, on Oct 18, 19 and 20. There will be a waiting list and any available spaces after August 15, or due to cancellations, will be given to people on the waiting list, whether or not they are members. APS membership is available for \$25.

Three Key Benefits of Marsha Savage Workshops

"My workshops encourage the student to study the key elements of starting a painting in a controlled way. A plan is made, started and keeps the student on track, instead of just "flying the by the seat of their pants." Besides at times being intuitive and following that "gut" reaction, a sense of control should be maintained. Studying with a teacher in a workshop allows students to ask their own questions, but more importantly to see and listen to other students' questions and processes. Many times a student may not even know the question they wish to ask. I encourage students to listen to what the other students are asking and what my response to those questions might be.

Learning to enjoy the journey of painting, not necessarily trying to finish a piece is a key element in my discussions during the whole of the workshop. This also means to follow their own their own path, taking what they need from the workshop and are capable of at their stage, not just learning to paint in the style of the instructor.
