Description of Program

The ever-changing sky, whether it holds peaceful cumulus clouds or dark and dramatic storm clouds, is my favorite subject to paint. I have photographed thousands of different cloud formations which serve as the subjects for my paintings. In my presentation, I'll discuss how to incorporate dramatic and realistic clouds into your landscape paintings and also how to create beautiful abstract cloud paintings. During the demonstration, I will paint portions of several different types of clouds to show how to create a believable sky by studying the light and using soft edges to "set" the clouds. In addition, I will discuss how to maximize the use of your cloud photos to increase the interest of your paintings.

Afternoon Workshop 1 - 4 PM











In the afternoon workshop, I will assist each artist working on a sky painting of their own choosing (including the land is optional). You can bring your own sky photos or I will have a variety of images that you are welcome to use. I use sanded pastel paper for my pastel surface and recommend that, as it will hold a large number of pastel layers and give greater depth to your skies. Generally I use Ampersand Pastelboard, UArt or Art Spectrum sanded surfaces. I will also be bringing 11×14 sanded paper and three layer foamboard painting transport cases if you wish to purchase them at the workshop. Bring a variety of hard to soft pastels. I often do an underpainting in Nupastels in red or rust colors. Then I use primarily blues, whites, lavenders, turquoise and purples, yellows, maybe some soft mint greens, but often end up using an even wider range of colors. If you plan on painting a sunset, bring everything! Additional recommended supplies are your easel, paper towels, baby wipes, tape, floor covering, and a plastic grocery bag (for the underpainting).

About the Artist

Pastel artist **Regina Calton Burchett** specializes in impressionistic landscapes, city scenes, and sky paintings. She studied art at Michigan State University and after graduation, continued studying drawing, acrylic and watercolor painting, calligraphy, stone sculpture, weaving, and computer animation. Burchett was a geologic drafter and an architectural stone drafter for most of her career. She began using pastels in the 1990's and realized that this was the medium she loved.

Burchett is a member of the Piedmont Pastel Society (the organization's webmaster) and the Campagna Society of Artists. She works and teaches drawing and pastel classes from her studio at Clearwater Artist Studios in Concord, N.C. Burchett also teaches computer classes and designs websites for artists and galleries. ABOUT THE ARTIST

Stan Sperlak was born in Denver, CO in 1960. He spent many years traveling the country as his parents were transferred by the military from Hawaii, Minnesota and New York to finally settle in Cape May, NJ in 1974. Sperlak showed an early interest in drawing and photography, and was also involved in music and poetry during and after his high school years. He has resided in Cape May Court House and Goshen NJ Since 1985, marrying and having two sons.

Speriak attended The Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts during 1995-1998 studying with Al Gury, Jill Rupinski, Maggie Gilboy and others. During 1998-99, Speriak studied at the home of fellow artist and noted landscape architect William Frederick of Hockessin, DE who had arranged for private classes by Academy teacher Patrick Arnold. These classes were conducted outdoors at Frederick's garden. Speriak also studied from 1997-2003 with Patricia Vanaman Witt, founder of the Barn Studio of Art in Millville, NJ. This study focused primarily on plein air landscape painting at the Burcham's Farm on the Maurice River in Port Elizabeth, NJ. Speriak also studied with Louis Sidney Mohollen, a student of Hobson Pittman who

In 1997 Speriak purchased 37 acres of farmland, forest and marsh in Goshen, NJ along the Crow Creek and started work on a studio and future teaching facility. In 2003 with the encouragement of Pat Witt, Speriak embarked on carrying forth Witt's traditions of plein air teachings and style. Crow Creek Farm is now the main facility for his teaching. Speriak has also taught in Maine, Colorado, South Carolina, Pennsylvania and Maryland. He has been invited to teach and speak at art centers across the US.

Speriak's overall emphasis on teaching has been a continuation of the lineage taught at the Academy and Witt's work, where painting outdoors should be an exercise in "note taking" with color and gesture from life, to capture the light and essence of a place, and to establish the basis for future works from these studies. But to also remember that as artists, one must synthesize their self and subject to truly express and create works of interest, that compel others to think beyond what might be just pretty, to what becomes a truth.

Speriak's latest works focuses primarily on the landscape of the Mid Atlantic. Shorelines, marshes, fields, skies, boats, fisherman and night scenes are often explored while there are examples of figures in the landscape as well and to a lesser extent, figurative paintings. His strongest influences are Robert Henri, George Inness, William Lathrop and NC Wyeth.

Since 1998 Sperials has been showing professionally, taking the traditional route of entering shows and street fairs in the greater Philadelphia/South Jersey area. He is currently represented by SOMA Gallery in Cape May, NJ, William Ris Gallery in Stone Harbor, NJ, Main Line Art in Philadelphia PA, Hardcastle Gallery in Wilmington, DE, Main Street Gallery in Annapolis, MD, Laura Craig Galleries, Scranton PA and Bishop's Stock Gallery in Snow Hill, Md, His works are also in the permanent collection of the Noyes Museum in Oceanville, NJ

Sperlak is a signature member of the Pastel Society of America, the Maryland Pastel Society and a member of the Pastel Society of Colorado. He is also a member of the Mid Atlantic Plein Air Painters Association, having served on the Board of Directors since 2005. He is a member and past President of The Cape May County Art League.
