APS Adventures in Pastel Adventure AAA-4: "Send in the Clouds"

Welcome to our fourth Pastel Adventure in Series AAA. The focus of this Adventure is painting clouds:

"I've looked at clouds from both sides now, From up and down and still somehow Its clouds illusions I recall I really don't know clouds at all."

These lyrics are from Joni Mitchell's 1967 song, "Both Sides Now". Interestingly, at the end of the song she switches the lyrics to "I really don't know life at all." Here's how this challenge will work:

- Step 1: Review the lyric of Joni Mithchell's hit song "Both Sides Now". Then consider the many artists that are known for painting amazing clouds, such as, Maxfield Parrish, NC Wyeth and Eric Sloane to name a few. (See illustration below.) The clouds were often the main character of the painting and, even more often, they played a significant supporting role.
- Step 2: Make a decision to go bold or mild with your cloud painting. In other words, you can make them the focus or you can employ them in a significant secondary role. The choice is yours. Likewise, feel free to add mountains, people, water, trees or whatever suits your style.
- Step 3: The details as to size, color, surface, etc are all up to you the artist. You might just find out that after this challenge you really do know clouds!
- Step 4: Take a photo of your painting and tell us why you chose this particular inspiration. Be sure to include the title and the size of your artwork. Also, please feel free to make comments on the surface and the pastels you used for this challenge.
- Step 5: Send the photo of your artwork, your comments, and the title and size of your painting to Kay Gordon (jkaygordon364@gmail.com) by October 27th at 6:00 PM.
- Step 6: Remember, this deadline is firm and nothing can be posted that is received after 6 PM on October 27th. Your painting does not need to be in its finished form. This adventure is so we can paint and learn together. So relax and have fun looking up at the sky!



Hunting for Seashells 9.5 x 12.5

I find that painting clouds is always a challenge, whether I am painting outside from life or inside from a photo/sketch reference. This Challenge was a very good exercise. Thank you so much!

I have always wanted to capture this scene of my husband and my Dad hunting for seashells. It was such a special afternoon. The Florida skies are so wide and blue, accented by bunches of puffy cotton clouds being pushed by the strong winds. The beaches are pinkish, flat and very deep.

I wanted to convey the magnitude of this scene and power of the sky through these tiny figures on this huge expanse of beach under the massive Florida sky, two friends so engrossed with each other in hunting for shells.

The clouds are playing a secondary role in this painting (though perhaps a large one). To me it is all about the men hunting for seashells on this Florida beach.

i used La Carte sanded pastel paper (Green/Grey colour) and soft pastels (Unison, Terry Ludwig, Richeson, Rembrandt, Diane Townsend Soft Form, with Nupastels and Rembrandt for the dry underpainting).

Since then I have studied clouds, so I could accurately portray them in the landscapes behind my animal paintings. I discovered that to make clouds look real, I needed to treat them as solid objects with highlights, shadows and cast shadows, and I needed many accurate reference photos to work from.

Whenever I am out, I keep my phone handy so I can record unusual cloud shapes and groupings. This painting is based on a photo that I look earlier this year... it reminded me of the boot that a certain dashing cat wore along with his wide-brimmed hat and belted sword scabbard... Puss 'n Boots.

In my reference photo, there were some tree silhouettes in the lower right corner... but I have decided to leave them out for now.

The photo was shared with me by a friend who had been visiting Colorado during last year's terrible wildfires.


I could not resist asking permission to paint this scene.. thanks for the challenge as it got me moving on this one.

I enjoyed working with the many colors in the clouds and incorporating them in the rest of the painting.


