
My painting is entitled A Day Fishing. It's from a photo taken I think outside of Portland, Maine.

"Yes, there are descriptive elements that tempt the artist and that often add to the uniqueness and charm of the image, but woe to the artist for whom these elements become primary, who thereby loses sight of the larger issues that alone guarantee that the resulting work represents the artist's thought and energy, not merely his copying instinct or descriptive facility." **Wolf Kahn**










Hi Adventure coordinator: This time I chose a contemporary pastel artist for "style" emulation and went with that bold and fearless colorist Laurinda O'Connor. Attached is one of her woodsy scenes as my inspiration placed next to my reference photo of my backyard at sunrise last fall. She often starts with a very dark underpainting or uses dark paper. So I used UART dark.



I learned 3 things from this challenge: laying down enough darks is always so important; you will never have the olive green you need; and it will take me years of practice to produce the strong confident marks that hallmark her work. This Adventure one was a great learning experience. Thank you APS for doing these.

I am practicing layering various hues of the same value and varying my marks. Alain does thumbnails to locate values and create compositions. I am doing that now as well and realize how it helps set a map for color studies and stepping up the size for a larger piece. Alain Picard is an inspiring and supportive teacher. His teaching skills, and knowledge of the masters are invaluable. His paintings cover all subject matter from portraits to still life to landscapes, street scenes and figurative.

My 3 paintings:

- 1: Alain Picard's market fish thumbnail and colored painting demo.
- 2: This week's painting: adventure: "Catnip Fish Dreams" Thumbnail 6.5 x 4.5 on toned grey Strathmore sketch paper using tombow pens, charcoals and white marker.
- 3: "Catnip Fish Dreams" color study. 12 x 9 on Pastelmat. Using assorted soft pastels This is my kitty Rosie. She was taking a kitty nap next to her fish catnip toy. This study is unfinished...I am still working on the background and will add a few larger fish toys. After a harrowing, stressful 2 weeks I felt like doing something more whimsical.
